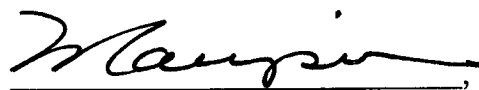

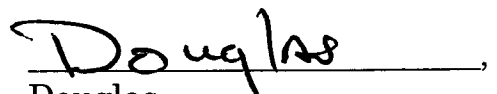
ORDER DISMISSING PETITION FOR WRIT  
OF MANDAMUS AS MOOT

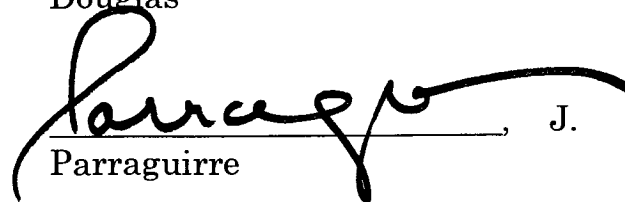
This original proper person petition for a writ of mandamus challenges a district court order that granted a motion for attorney fees and costs filed by real party in interest Charlestonwood Apartments and Terrie Locklin, Charlestonwood's co-defendant in the underlying case. Based on documents submitted by petitioner, it appears that this petition is now moot. Specifically, petitioner is challenging a July 2, 2004 district court order directing him and Jay Silverman, the plaintiff in the underlying case, to pay attorney fees and costs. Petitioner points out that he was not a party to the underlying case and argues that he was improperly directed to pay fees and costs. Petitioner has now provided this court with a copy of an amended order, filed on February 9, 2005, granting the motion for attorney fees and costs and directing only Jay Silverman to pay attorney fees and costs. Consequently, petitioner's name is no longer listed as being required to pay fees and costs on the order. As

petitioner is no longer being directed to pay attorney fees and costs, this petition is now moot. Accordingly, we dismiss the petition.<sup>1</sup>

It is so ORDERED.<sup>2</sup>
